Copper Hills Students Create New Law for Schools

WHAT HAPPENS TO STUDENTS WHO ARE OFF-campus during a lockdown? Last year at Copper Hills High, they had the unfortunate experience of finding out. The school was put on lockdown because of a possible threat of a man outside with a gun. The release-time students attending LDS seminary in an adjacent building did not get word of the situation and were let out of class. When they got back to the school, they were locked out.

“Can you imagine what would have happened if those students had been in harm’s way?”

asked Sen. Aaron Osmond (R—West Jordan). The students in the A.P. Government classes at Copper Hills wanted to

make sure it didn’t happen again.

“We have a unique issue in this state. Our school administrators under state law were not allowed to contact students who were on release-time because they were viewed as separate from the school,” Osmond said. “This bill fundamentally changes the way we work with our release-time students. It

requires the administration to have a plan to notify students on release-time when there is a lockdown scenario.”

Osmond said school officials must do everything possible to let the students who are off-campus know there’s a problem, and that they are not to come back until the situation clears.

“If this bill saves just one life or protects

Rio Tinto Cleaning Up Arsenic Contaminated Soils

THE BARNEY'S CANYON GOLD MINE CEASED operations more than 10 years ago, but a recent discovery of elevated levels of arsenic near the Sycamores subdivision has the mining company working with the City of West Jordan to remove the affected soils.

On April 23, Rio Tinto Kennecott representatives reported to the West Jordan City Council the series of events leading to the detection of the arsenic contamination in the west Clay Hollow Wash area. Principal Advisor of Land Quality Theiss Lindsay presented the council with a plan for clean-up and reclamation of the area.

"With the use of excavators and small over-the-road trucks, we'll remove the material," he said. "We'll have workers out there with dust collection devices to be able to understand and know what's going to be happening, and if any contamination is making it out of the construction area. They'll also be controlling dust to the best possible degree with dust suppressant and water."

Professionals will use both handheld devices and lab samples to test for

remaining contamination and ensure complete removal of the arsenic-laced soil.

"After removal has taken place and confirmation samples have been returned, we'll restore the site, as close as possible, to what it was before... and vegetate as directed by the city," Lindsay said.

High concentrations of the potentially deadly element were found near the mining operation's heap leach pads during final closure procedures earlier this year. Initially, technical crews thought the problem was isolated to the mine property, but after following the contamination down

the canyon, they discovered that the arsenic had crossed their borders into soils on West Jordan owned property.

"We brought out some additional instrumentation to verify that these readings were correct, at which time we also took some lab samples," Lindsay said. "We [had] sufficient concerns with the concentration that we notified the Department of Environmental Quality right away."

Following state and federal guidelines,

the company began reporting to the proper agencies, and notifying city officials and residents of the discovery. Measures were taken to contain and prevent the arsenic from traveling outside the affected area. Silt fencing, installed along the border of the two properties, will prevent further contamination of West Jordan soils. Temporary fences were erected to keep residents out of the area.

City Manager Rick Davis reported that his engineers have no reason to suspect that there is any risk for groundwater contamination from the arsenic.

"We don't have any water sources —pumps, wells, etc. —in any vicinity of the current contamination, so they determined there was not an immediate threat," Davis said. "If we became aware of a contaminating nature that was dangerous, we would act on that."

Clean up of the contamination site is expected to take approximately six weeks. Crews will limit construction efforts to the hours of 8 a.m. to 3 p.m. to minimize the risk of resident and equipment interaction. ✦

a student from being injured, all of these efforts were worth it," Osmond said.

The students in the A.P. Government class have been given opportunities in the past to research and present bills that the state senator prepares, but this year was different.

"We saw a problem and created our own bill. We came up with the idea of it from local concerns," said Quinn Everett, a student in the class. "They only have three other ceremonies that they don't sign at the Capitol, and this is one of them. It was really fun to be a part of."

The students did all the research and prepared the bill under the direction of their teacher, Dennis Randall. In March, four students: Matt Hansen, Abby Acton, Cassidy Gummersall and Raegan Stirling,

were chosen to present the bill in front of the Utah Senate Education Committee. The other government students attended the presentation at the State Capitol to support their classmates. When the bill passed, the governor decided to sign it into law amongst the students who did all the hard work.

Gov. Gary Herbert and Sen. Osmond attended the ceremonial signing in the Copper Hills High School auditorium in April, one month after it passed in the legislature. Students from social studies and other advanced placement classes attended this historically significant event.

"It illustrates a point that small groups of people, individuals, can make a significantly big difference by just getting involved. We have too many people who are apathetic; they are ignorant of the issues," Herbert explained to the students. "You are the leaders of tomorrow."

After the signing, the governor addressed the students on the issues of safety and bullying. He encouraged them to stand up for what is right.

"If you get involved, you can make a difference. This is a school that's making a significant difference in so many ways, not just the one we're talking about today," Herbert said. ✦

Herbert Addresses Topics of Suicide, Bullying

AFTER SIGNING A NEW BILL INTO LAW AT Copper Hills High School to add to student safety, Gov. Gary Herbert took a moment to address the students about two very pressing, very sobering issues: suicide and bullying.

"I like to talk about the positive things we have going on in Utah, but today I'm talking about something that should cause us to reflect about what we could do better to improve these statistics," the governor said. "Suicide is the second-leading cause of death for young adults in Utah; two young people are treated every day for suicide attempts, (and) Utah has the seventh highest suicide rate in the nation."

The governor entreated the student body to help put a stop to this travesty. He encouraged the students to look for

opportunities to be a friend and make someone's life better. He told them to be on the lookout for inappropriate behavior.

"The most obvious type of bullying is physical. We also have verbal, emotional and internet bullying, which are less observable, but no less painful for the recipient," Herbert stated. "I'm very much concerned about all types of bullying, but cyber-bullying is on the rise and it's hard to get away from. Don't use technology as a weapon."

Herbert urged the students to stand up and be counted against bullying, which could possibly save someone from suicide.

"I'm here as the governor of the great state of Utah to ask you to help me today to stop this rise in suicide, to stop this rise in bullying. Bullying stops today, here and now, with your help," he concluded.

Maintaining West Jordan's Urban Forest

THE CITY OF WEST JORDAN HAS MORE THAN 13,800 trees, managed and maintained by a crew of one - Urban Forester Dave Naylor.

He's more than just an arborist tasked with pruning and caring for individual trees; he's a parks professional responsible for managing an entire forest spread amongst more than 300 city-owned properties. From reviewing plans for new developments to managing current inventory and overseeing the planting of new trees, Naylor does it all.

"I utilize a lot of volunteer groups, scout groups, service days.... I spend a lot of time going to tree-related projects. Right now, I'm working on getting an asset management program in place," he said. "For one guy, I definitely have a full plate."

On April 17, his endless efforts were once again recognized as the city was named a Tree City USA by the Arbor Day Foundation for the 18th straight year. The award recognizes cities that meet or exceed a set of four core standards, which include maintaining a tree department, writing a tree care ordinance, spending at least \$2 per capita in a community forestry program and hosting an Arbor Day celebration.

"People actually notice the Tree City USA sign as they drive through the city and they know we have a priority to maintain our trees for the community," Naylor said.

"I look forward to trying for the award every year."

But, he added, maintaining an urban forest is about much more than just an award. Trees provide a significant contribution to the environment; not only cleaning the air, but providing shade, keeping energy costs down and holding soils in place so they don't erode away.

An urban forest of healthy, well-cared for trees is also essential to the look and feel of the city, he said.

"The aesthetic environment of our community is undeniably tied to our quality of life, economic development, and to property values," City Manager Rick Davis said. "There's just such a connectivity that trees provide. What the award really recognizes is the city's commitment to that."

West Jordan residents can play an important part in protecting the city's urban forest, Naylor said. Whether it's in being one of the 410 volunteers who provided more than 1,600 hours of service helping with tree planting and care, a parent teaching their children how to respect the environment, or a home owner caring for trees on their private property, everyone can make a difference.

"Know that trees can receive damage.

Regional Park with Splash Pad Opens May 30

RECREATION, PLAYGROUNDS AND LOTS OF water are summertime essentials for many families. Soon, all three will be available at one location in West Jordan.

On Friday, May 30, at 2:30 p.m., city officials will commemorate the grand opening of the Ron Wood Regional Park, featuring the “all-abilities” Sierra Newbold Playground and a highly-anticipated splash pad.

“The playground itself is a multi-ability type of program where children of all physical and intellectual abilities can go and be safe,” City Manager Rick Davis said.

Additional park amenities include a

the Ron Wood name would be expanded to encompass not only the baseball complex, but also the entire park. The move reaffirmed the city’s commitment to honor fallen West Jordan Officer Ron Wood, who was killed in the line of duty in 2002.

“We want to make sure this man’s name is honored and expanded in a way that’s fitting of a man who would give a sacrifice like Ron Wood did,” Sgt. Keith Bronson told the council.

More recently, city leaders determined that they wanted the play structures at the park to be more than just a run-of-the-mill playground. Councilmember Justin Stoker said they wanted it to be something that anyone

Following the ribbon cutting celebration, Utah Jazz representatives will present a free “get fit” clinic at the new court. The West Jordan Police Department will be onsite with police vehicles, K-9 demonstrations and a physical training obstacle course for any kids (or adults) who feel up to the challenge.

The event will be one of both celebration and remembrance.

It was more than a year and a half ago that the city council approved a resolution to construct a multi-use recreation area on the 35 acres of city-owned property adjacent to the existing Ron Wood Baseball Complex. The decision came after many residents had already been waiting five years for the promised park.

The completed amenities fill approximately 10 acres of the property. The remaining 25 acres are expected to be developed into additional sports fields sometime in the next five years.

In March 2013, it was determined that

could enjoy and an asset in the community that “really stood for something.” With support from the Newbold family, city leaders decided to name the playground in honor of Sierra Newbold, the 6-year-old West Jordan girl whose tragic death in 2012 shocked the entire community.

“When Councilmember Ben Southworth and I were assigned to the park, there were a number of opinions that were shared with regards to giving a theme or purpose to the playground. I’m glad that we can use this as a means to hopefully identify and eliminate child abuse within our community and honor Sierra.” ✦

Don’t break the branches or hang on the trees; it does have a lasting effect on them. If people will teach their kids to respect their surroundings and the trees, let them grow and mature, then it’s a resource we don’t have to replace,” Naylor said.

New WJ Logo Marks an Era of Change

IMAGINE A WEST JORDAN THAT'S THE economic hub for the entire valley. At first glance, it may seem like an inconceivable goal, but it's exactly what leaders in West Jordan envision for Utah's fourth largest city.

On March 26, the city council approved a resolution to phase out the current City of West Jordan logo, which has stood as the city's symbol since 1980, in favor of a new, more modern image. They said adoption of the logo isn't intended to remake West Jordan on its own, but it signifies the coming changes proposed by the "Imagine West Jordan" community branding campaign.

"The logo is just a symbol... it's a symbol that we're entering into a new

era," City Manager Rick Davis said. "Branding is the redevelopment of our downtown; it's the metamorphosis that we've taken our economic development through. Branding is the parks, trails and open space commitment of our community; it's the improved communication with our businesses and citizens. This is really where you change the image of our community."

When Davis came to the city in 2011, he was told that West Jordan had the worst development process in the state. Putting his years of branding experience to the task, he coordinated with the city council, the chamber of commerce, local businesses and city staff to develop a plan to improve West Jordan's image.

Now, he said, businesses and other government leaders are praising West

Jordan for being a great city to work with. Recently, the city received an A-for developer relations, based on a study commissioned by the National Association of Industrial and Office Property.

"Branding is what happens when people change their perspective about your city," Davis said. "The broader it is, the more permanent it is, but it takes time."

The re-branding effort will focus on four key components: community aesthetics, infrastructure, efficiency and customer service. Davis said residents can expect to see an increased emphasis on these areas over the next few years.

"As we elevate the perception of West Jordan, we'll find that there are good things in store for the future," Mayor Kim V. Rolfe said.

That future includes a complete redevelopment of the downtown West Jordan area, between 8200 South and 7800 South and from Redwood Road to 1300 West. Planning for the downtown development is still in the preliminary stages, but Davis said he's fairly confident that the area will take on a mixed-use feel, incorporating office, residential and commercial space.



Over the coming months and years, this new logo for the City of West Jordan will replace the 34-year-old image currently in use by the city.

"We're eager to implement things like a hotel and conference space; we're eager to bring in retailers... businesses that will be a destination for people, not just more of the same thing, but truly unique types of stores," Davis said.

Part of the branding campaign will also include a communications initiative advertising West Jordan to neighboring businesses and communities. Clips from the city's "Imagine West Jordan" video, launched earlier this year, will play at the Jordan Landing Cinemark Theaters prior to movie showings. The full video can be viewed at wjordan.com ✦

Happy Mother's Day, Mom

THIS IS THE FOURTH MOTHER'S DAY WITHOUT MY MOM. It seems like just yesterday my siblings and I were making her breakfast in bed. We'd pour her a bowl of corn flakes with milk and bananas, toast some bread, and then run outside to pick a bouquet of the spring flowers she'd waited for all winter.

I consider it a miracle (and a lesson in patience) she didn't visually cringe when we handed her all of her tulips, daffodils, hyacinths and lilacs, along with her cold, soggy Mother's Day breakfast.

My mom fought breast cancer for years before losing the battle two days after her 64th birthday in December 2010. Although she would have hated the viewing before her funeral (she did NOT want to be on display), she would have been amazed by the people who traveled cross-country to North Carolina, at Christmastime, to honor her life.

Because of my mom, I'm a voracious reader. She frequently took us kids to the Murray library for storytime with Mrs. Strange, and we'd bring home loads of books that she would read to us over and over again. She encouraged us to memorize poetry by taping a poem to the fridge each week, and we were probably the only kids in the world with hand-made finger puppets for Hamlet and Beowulf.



Most days, I'd come home from school to the smell of freshly baked bread or cookies (I blame her for my sugar addiction), and I will never forgive myself for begging her to buy Wonder Bread when, instead, she forced us to eat bread, warm from the oven with butter and homemade raspberry jam.

My mom loved gardening. She browsed seed catalogs and flower books, always looking for unique plants to add to her garden. She loved the idea of magic and fairies, and encouraged her kids and grandkids to look for elfin signs among the blossoms.

When the globe willow in our yard had to be cut down, she cried like she'd lost a family member. It had been a place for grandchildren to swing in and climb on. My daughter and her cousin would have lived in that tree if we'd let them.

Mom always knew what to do in an emergency. Except for the time my brother knocked the wind out of his lungs and she thought he was choking, so she performed the Heimlich, squeezing out whatever air was left in his body. I don't think he took a breath for 30 minutes.

And although my mom was pretty patient, as I got older I could recognize when she was about to come unglued. Her teeth would clench, and a little muscle in the side of her jaw would twitch. That was our signal to run far and fast.

Mother's Day just isn't the same without mom. Everyday life isn't the same without her. We've passed around her recipes, her stories, her favorite books and her photo albums. We wish she could have been around to see the newest grandchildren and great-grandkids, because she loved being a grandma: another quality she taught me.

What I wouldn't do to be able to pick up the phone and give my mom a call on Mother's Day. What I wouldn't give to bring her a bowl of soggy corn flakes and an armful of spring flowers. ✦

“[She] had a gash mark atop her head... you could almost see down to the skull. She fell down the stairs and as a result, this crazy motorist flagged these guys down in the middle of the intersection on 7800 and Bacchus and asked for some assistance,” Wallpole said. “This crazy motorist was myself.”

Montgomery and Trevino, who were returning from training activities when they stopped to assist Wallpole, contacted the nearest fire station, but paramedics were already out on a call. Rather than wait for another ambulance, Trevino climbed in the backseat with the young girl, calming and reassuring both her and her father. He rode with the pair to the hospital while Montgomery called ahead to the emergency room to notify them of the situation.

Wallpole said the concern and care that the two firefighters displayed during the incident made a significant difference, and he was grateful for the opportunity to personally and publicly thank them.

The pair said they were honored by the recognition and glad their efforts made a difference for the Wallpoles.

“We were glad we could be there to help,” Montgomery said. “It’s nice for someone to take the time to recognize the department and it obviously meant a lot to Josh; it calmed him down and helped his daughter, too.” ✦

Upcoming Festival Will Celebrate the Jordan River

MORE THAN 40 YEARS AGO, THE JORDAN River was in a state of wanton neglect, the result of poor stewardship and active contamination. Today, government, non-profit and corporate partners are slowly cleaning and repairing the 51-mile river corridor, making it a destination nature and recreation retreat in the middle of a growing urban environment.

On Saturday, May 31, from 10 a.m. to 2 p.m., the City of West Jordan will collaborate with the Jordan River Commission and other agencies to host the first annual Get Into the River Festival, presented by Wells Fargo. Cities up and down the Jordan River Parkway will provide a variety of educational and recreation activities for the whole family.

“First and foremost, we want people to come down, ride their bikes, walk, run...take the opportunity to visit as many sites along the trail as they can,” event coordinator Jen Parsons-Soran said. “We have urban fishing ponds, we have dog parks, and we have beautiful trails where you get the opportunity to feel like you’re not in the middle of the city. We really want people to come out and recreate.”

The festival will celebrate not only the river, but also the completion of a 1.25 mile section of the parkway through West Jordan, from approximately 8600 South to 9000 South, which was previously one of four gaps in the pedestrian/biking trail. When the remaining gaps are closed, the trail will span approximately 45 miles, reaching from the Great Salt Lake at its northern end down to Utah Lake in the south.

A 10 a.m. ribbon-cutting ceremony will mark the grand opening of the 9000 South pedestrian tunnel, a key component in closing the gap and connecting West Jordan and Sandy in this section of the trail.

“This has been several years coming for the city. Former Mayor [Melissa] Johnson began several years ago to lobby for assistance from the state,” City Manager Rick Davis said. “Our legislative delegation really came through to help us find the funding for that tunnel.”

Leading up to the event, corporate and community organizations will participate in a conservation day, pulling

Are You A Good Neighbor?

COMMON CODE VIOLATIONS

The City of West Jordan has local laws or codes to keep your neighborhood safer, healthier, quieter and more attractive. The Code Enforcement Division has the primary responsibility for enforcing these city codes and ordinances. Ordinances enforced by the Code Enforcement Division include: high grass, weeds, trash and debris accumulation, dismantled or inoperable vehicles, substandard/unsafe housing, sign regulations, and commercial vehicle parking. In addition to responding to complaints, Code Enforcement officers patrol the city and look for violations, assist in coordinating clean-up efforts, and issue notices, warnings, and citations. You can submit a service request by emailing code@wjordan.com or using the City smartphone app available for Android and iPhone.

City Codes

- **Tree Canopy:** All trees planted within 15' from a street curb shall be pruned to remove all branches to a height of at least 8' above the elevation of the curb. For streets that have no curb, this provision applies to trees within 15' from the edge of street paving.
- **Weeds:** Any injurious or noxious weeds, garbage, refuse, or unsightly or deleterious objects. For purpose of this definition, "injurious weeds" and "noxious weeds" shall mean those plants growing in an uncultivated state, not used for food, fiber or ornamentation, extending in height greater than 12" aboveground.
- **Parking or Storing of Inoperable Vehicles:** It shall be unlawful to park, store, leave or permit the parking, storing or leaving of any licensed or unlicensed motor vehicle of any kind, or parts thereof,

which is in a wrecked, junked, partially dismantled, inoperative or abandoned condition, whether attended or not, upon any private or public property within the city limits for longer than 72 hours. Inoperable motor vehicles, or parts thereof, may be stored within a completely enclosed building

- **Storage of trash and debris:** No person shall store, leave or accumulate junk, garbage, trash, debris, or inoperable, abandoned



or unused equipment, appliances, furniture or other tangible personal property in any yard, open space or other land.

- **Trash Can removal:** Trash cans must not be set out upon the street for collection prior to 6 p.m. of the evening before the day of collection. All empty containers must be removed from the street as soon as practical after being emptied and in every case must be removed from the street the same day they are emptied.
- **Location Of Watercraft, Trailers, Campers, Recreational Vehicles And Motor Homes:** Watercraft, trailers, campers, recreational vehicles and motor homes stored in the front yard of any residential lot or on the

paved portion of the side yard of a residential lot are subject to the following conditions:

1. Can't park closer than 10' from the edge of the sidewalk nearest the home or structure. If no sidewalk, can't park closer than 10' from the curb or edge of pavement and can't extend onto a sidewalk.
2. Must meet current licensing requirements and be well maintained.

3. A motor home or travel trailer can be occupied by a guest for up to 14 consecutive days per calendar quarter, provided the motor home or travel trailer meets the front and side yard setback requirements.
4. Parking areas shall have a surface constructed of asphalt, concrete, grasscrete, a minimum 3/4" or larger gravel mix, pavers, permeable asphalt or concrete, rock, stone, turf block, or any combination of the aforementioned materials. Gravel, gravel mix, crushed rock and stone shall have a minimum depth of 4".

Cal Ripken Baseball League Flourishing

SEVERAL FANS SIT ON METAL BENCHES cheering for future superstars at Ron Wood Park in West Jordan on many nights and Saturdays. This Cal Ripken and Babe Ruth affiliated baseball league is hopping with excitement.

The league has over 700 players participating this season from ages 3-15, 200 more than the league expected to have sign up.

“We want to help these kids become better citizens and people. They also learn to understand sportsmanship and the game of baseball,” league president Jason Saunders said. “This is a safe place for kids to play and learn the game.”

The league offers a chance for any skill level player. Younger players start in t-ball and machine pitch. More advanced can play in the league’s accelerated program against teams from all over the state.

“Four years ago, the league wanted to offer a place other than super leagues for its players. It has become



a cheaper option. They play against teams from Vernal, Murray, Riverton and Taylorsville,” Saunders said.

The Copper Hills Cal Ripken accelerated program offers one team in each age group. They play doubleheaders on Saturdays in addition to their weekday regular season games.

Copper Hills High baseball head coach John Morgan has helped support the league, offering his players a chance to umpire and volunteer. Saunders said his willingness to help has been most important to the program.

“Our community support and willingness to help is what makes our league different. This year our numbers increased by 200 because of parents telling other parents. Everyone who comes to play is part of our baseball family; it is a great place to play,” league secretary Teresa Atherley said.

They will host their only fundraiser, a breakfast and hit-a-thon, on Saturday, May 17 at 8 a.m.

“They must participate in our regular season. It gives kids an option to play with their friends and still play more competitive baseball,” Saunders said.

Coaches in the league pass background checks and are certified by Cal Ripken Baseball. The league is run by volunteers. The 13-15 year old divisions were

Snow College competes as a junior college in the Scenic West Athletic Conference. They finished last season 13-16.


"She is a very focused and determined young lady and I am excited to coach someone with her dedication and desire to play her very best," Visger said. ✦

WEST JORDAN AND COPPER HILLS HIGH School track and field athletes are preparing to compete in the state finals. Dreams of capturing the state title lie in their individual and team preparation.

“We really focus on the team concept. We want the kids to support each other—make sure that everyone is coming to practice and the other team events we have. We have a young team and have had several injuries, so we are trying to limp through the season,” Copper Hills head track coach Garth Rushforth said.

The Copper Hills boys team placed third in its home invitational April 12. They finished just .7 points behind Herriman.

“Our boys team is strong this year. We have some talent there,” Rushforth said.

Skyler Andam and Cameron Norton are the team leaders in the boys 100 meters. Andam placed fourth at the Copper Hills Invitational; Norton was seventh.

Desiree Anderson set a top 10 time at 15.94 seconds in the 100 meter hurdles March 19 in a tri-team event against Jordan and Bingham. She is also a top 10 high jumper.

The boys 4x400 relay team of Kimball Booth, Michael Martinez, Robert Diamond and Ian Maxfield placed second at Herriman. They were edged out by last year’s state championship team, Davis, at the line.

Martinez holds the eighth fastest 100 meter time in the state this season. He finished eighth at the Davis Invitational with a time of 11.13 seconds.





Terra Linda Elementary Welcomes Local Artist

"He has painted book covers, he has painted walls, and he has painted people, landscapes and buildings," said Heather Heugly, a member of the school staff that helps with "Meet the Masters".

"He loves history and he draws people that have done wonderful things," Heugly said. Corbett brought his paintings of Abraham Lincoln and Frederick Douglass, and showed photographs of his other paintings. He encouraged the students to make a living doing something they loved.

"That's what you've got to find out in life. What is it that you love to do?" Corbett asked. ✦

IN A WORLD OF ADVANCED TECHNOLOGY, ROBOTICS IS NO longer a futuristic notion. West Jordan Middle School is on the forefront of using robotics to promote science, technology, engineering and math.

“Our Intro to Engineering Class has received a grant for Vex Robotics,” said Brian Burke, the CTE Technology and Engineering teacher at West Jordan

Middle. “Vex Robotics is the premier robotics platform for higher level education and competitions.” This grant, along with funding from LEGO Mindstorm Robotics, enabled the school to acquire some startup robotics sets that allow the students a different method of learning.

“Robotics has always been part of the basic technology instruction at

all three grade levels,” Burke said. “The advance in available robotics kits has helped with the new emphasis.” Students can use the kits to design all kinds of different robotic creations, and sometimes take it to the next level.

“In Jordan District, students participate in robotics competitions as well as many others through local and national TSA (Technology Student Associations),” Burke said.

These students are getting a head start as the first middle school in the district to start a robotics club. This means they will be allowed to meet after school and compete in robotics competitions each year.

The students will compete in their classes throughout the year and have the opportunity to advance to the state finals held at the Jordan Applied Technology Center each March.

“As many as 400 students per year could be involved with robotics in my classes,” Burke said. Not only are the middle school students learning about this technology, but they are eager to share it with the younger, elementary school children.

“We are now working on a plan to have the middle school teachers work with and train teachers at the grade schools in robotics by offering after-school programs for the students,” Burke said. “Middle school students would also be involved in helping and training the grade school students.”

Learning this technology is not only helpful in the classroom, but it also helps students with the critical thinking process.

“I have long been interested in robotics,” Burke said. “Robotics allows us the opportunity to teach a lot of basic concepts in programming, electronics, communications, design, etc. in a hands-on way.”
